Is it correct to say gotten?

Is “Gotten” Correct? People in the [United States](#) and Canada use gotten for the past participle of got in most cases. People in English-speaking countries outside of the United States and Canada usually use got.

Have Got or Have Gotten?

Is it correct to say I have got or I have gotten? After doing some research, I don't feel bad about my uncertainty. This is a tricky area with several contributing factors and lots of different opinions. Let's see if I can shed some light on the issue. Definition of Get.

"haven't gotten", is that correct?

For American English, it'd be GOTTEN (get, got, gotten). So in your case, if it's British English, it doesn't seem right. It'd look like "I haven't got a reply yet" If that's American English you're talking about, "haven't gotten" is grammatically correct. However, people usually use "haven't received" instead of "haven't gotten" with "a reply".

Is it correct to say will do?

In American casual usage, the phrase “will do” is commonly used to mean “yes, I'll do that” or “yes I'll do as you asked”. But the point of that expression is to give assent in the fewest words possible, therefore no one would say “will do it” because “it” is an extra and unnecessary word.

Is many of whom correct?

A: It should be “whom.” The clause at the end of that sentence should read “ ... many of whom are held back by societal barriers.” ... In this clause, the subject is “many,” and the verb is “are.”

Is it correct to say thanks to you?

Saying "thanks" is more casual than saying "thank you". So if you're expressing gratitude for something bigger or you're in a more formal setting, "thank you" will sound more appropriate.

Is other than correct?

In your second sentence, other than means "different from or besides." It is correct. ... In those sentences, except for means "but for" and other than means "besides."

Is as the following correct?

“As follows is always the correct form, even for an enumeration of many things. The expression is elliptical for as it follows—not as they follow.”

Is it correct to say you are welcome?

After someone thanks you, the correct phrase is “you're welcome,” not “you're welcomed.” In the previous example, welcome is used as an adjective. Welcome can also serve as a verb (We welcome the summer!) or as an interjection (Welcome!), usually stated when greeting someone.

Is it correct to say me too?

In standard English, “me” is an object pronoun. ... So “me” is impeccably correct in cases where it's the implied object of an elliptical (or incomplete) sentence like “Me too.” For example, if we say, “She invited us to the party,” and you respond, “Me too,” you're using “me” correctly.

Is it correct to say down below?

Down below and bottom don't mean the same thing, but they share the meaning of "in the lower part of" something.

Is it correct to say where are you at?

Burchfield refers to “Where are you at?” as a tautologous regional usage. Clearly, we're better off without the “at.” (link) A preposition is a fine word to end a sentence with but the “at” in “Where are you at?” (or “At where are you?”) is just incorrect.

Is it correct to say that that?

A: When a sentence has two words back to back, like “that that” or “this this,” we hear an echo. But there's not necessarily anything wrong. ... But your sentences are good examples; both are grammatically correct and neither requires any special punctuation.

What words spell another word backwards?

Put simply, it describes a word that reads as another word when spelled backward. You see, emordnilap is the word palindrome spelled backward! A palindrome is a word or phrase that reads the same whether you spell it forwards or backward: "kayak," "madam," "racecar," and "refer" are some examples.

What 7 letter word is spelled the same backwards?

'Welcomed' is not correct English. The word 'welcome' is a short form of the phrase 'You are welcome'. 'Welcome' in this context is not a verb, but rather an adjective.
