What are the examples of monosyllabic?

"Yes", "no", "jump", "buy", and "heat" are monosyllables. The longest monosyllabic words in the English language, all containing nine letters each, are "screeched," "schlepped," "scratched," "scrounged," "scrunched," "stretched," "straights," and "strengths."

What are some examples of monosyllabic words?

Monosyllabic words are those which cannot be separated into two or more syllables. Example: Fe (faith) Muy (very) Voz (voice) Each syllable has to contain no less than one consonant and one vowel, or only a vowel. Also, the consonant "y" can be a monosyllable.
