Do change into passive voice?

Passive voice: When will the results be announced (by them)? The primary auxiliary verbs do, does or did does not appear in the passive form. The verbs has, have, had, will, shall, can, may etc., do not change their position at the beginning of the sentence when the active voice is changed to the passive voice.

Who did this change the voice?

The passive form of the sentence becomes This was done by whom?. For a more natural conversion, the word order can be inverted so that the interrogative, the words by whom?, come first. This question would be By whom was this done?, and means the same as the alternative.
