What does expiate mean in the Bible?

A blotting out or removal of sin; hence, the renewal of communion with God. The supreme act of expiation is Christ's death on the cross, the meaning of which is illuminated by a number of Old Testament themes.

What Do Expiation and Propitiation Mean?

The prefix ex means "out of" or "from," so expiation has to do with removing something or taking something away. In biblical terms, it has to do with taking away guilt through the payment of a penalty or the offering of an atonement. By contrast, propitiation has to do with the object of the expiation.

What is expiation?

Expiation means "to cover sin" and/or "to cleanse sin." Expiation reflects the idea that the negative and degrading effects of our sin are removed through the grace of God. Another word for expiation is atonement, and truly this is one of the results of Jesus' atoning death for us.

What does atone mean?

What does propitiatory mean in the Bible?

1. propitiatory - having power to atone for or offered by way of expiation or propitiation; "expiatory (or propitiatory) sacrifice" expiative, expiatory. 2. propitiatory - intended to reconcile or appease; "sent flowers as a propitiatory gesture" What is the spiritual meaning of unleavened bread?

Where did the phrase Woe is me come from?

This occurs in the Bible, Job 10:15 in the form 'woe unto me'. Job is one of the oldest books in the Old Testament, early versions of which date from about 1200BC, making the phrase 3,200 years old in its original language. The first occurrence of it in English would have been Wycliffe's Bible translation in 1382.

What does Abraham mean in Hebrew?

In the original Hebrew language of the Torah, which is the first five books of our Old Testament, the name Abram literally means "exalted father." The name Abraham, however, contains another unused root word, which roughly means "multitude." Abraham translated literally, then, means "father of a multitude." Most modern ...

Where was Job in the Bible from?

In the Greek Old Testament Book of Job And he himself was the son of his father Zare, one of the sons of Esau, and of his mother Bosorrha, so that he was the fifth from Abraam.

Who was Ahasuerus wife?

Vashti (Hebrew: וְשְׁתִּי, Vashti, Koine Greek: 'Aστίν Astín) was a queen of Persia and the first wife of Persian King Ahasuerus in the Book of Esther, a book included in the Hebrew Bible and the Old Testament and read on the Jewish holiday of Purim.

Is Genesis a Hebrew word?


